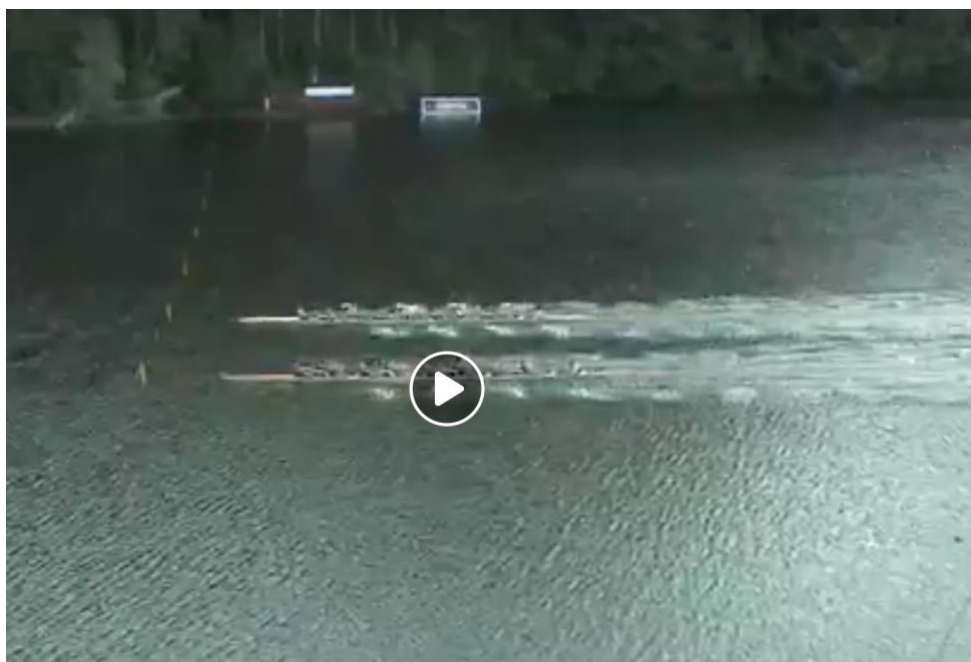

This was not the closest result in the Kings Cup. I have looked back 30 years and found that the Victorians have a knack of winning VERY close finishes. At Lake Barrington in 2003, they edged out Western Australia by 0.09 seconds and in 1993 at Lake Wivenhoe they again beat Western Australia by 0.09 seconds. All other margins over this period were more than 0.5 seconds and mostly between 1 and 3 seconds.

Kings also won the Year10 2nd Eight
Shore won the 1st, 2nd and 4th Fours, and had “podium” finishes in nine of the eleven races.
St Ignatius won the 2nd Eight, 3rd Four and the 1st, 2nd and 4th Year 10 Eights.
St Joseph's won the 3rd Eight

For interest, if one awards 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places with 4, 3, 2 and 1 points respectively and consider only the 1st and 2nd Eights, the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Fours and the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Year 10 Eights to get one version of a point score, Shore has 25, St Ignatius has 23, Kings has 13, Scots 11 and St Joseph's and Newington 9 points each. No other school finished in the top four in any race.

NSW Schoolboys Head of the River

16 schools competed including only one crew from just one of the GPS Schools. The fact that this regatta was held on the afternoon following the AAGPS Head of the River probably accounts for the absence of the junior (year 8 and 9) GPS crews whose presence for the last few years gave all schools the opportunity to match up and test themselves in boat classes the GPS schools don't normally compete in.

The final point score from the regatta was:

St Augustine's 32, Canberra Grammar 23, Radford 20.

St Augustine's won the Schoolboy Eight in a good time of 6m 05.19s. For interest, this compares with the Kings School's winning HoR time of 5m 58s, and would have achieved 6th place in the GPS 1st Eights race, just ahead of St Joseph's (6m 05.84s), but it needs to be noted that St Augustine's won their race by 23 seconds, so might have had “more in the tank” (not that you can compare different races).

NSW Schoolgirls Head of the River

This regatta was held the day after the boys' regattas. There are three point-scores: Junior, Senior and Total. The “Total” is not a sum of the others. Here are the first three places in all of them.

Junior: Queenwood 7.857, Roseville 7.6667, St Catherine's 7.444.
Senior: Kinross Wolaroi 8.11, St Catherine's 8.00, PLC Sydney 7.846.
Total: Pymble Ladies College 698, Queenwood 696, Loreto Kirribilli 441.

Kinross Wolaroi won the Schoolgirl Eight in a time of 6m 47.37, by a margin of 0.36s from Queenwood.

National Championships (Lake Barrington)

Schoolboys:

In the Champion Schoolboy Eight, both Shore and Newington qualified for the A final through the repechages. Shore came 2nd in their heat and might have gone straight through to the A final except for a rule breach resulting in relegation to 6th and the need to row in the repechage.

Shore won their repechage and were second in the A Final behind St Peters SA, and Newington's very young crew were 4th out of the eight in the A final and the 16 total entries.

St Augustine's was the only NSW entry in the U17 Schoolboy Eight and came 2nd as was Shore the only NSW entry in the Men's U19 Eight, also coming second.

Newington came 3rd in the Schoolboy coxed Quad A final.

Schoolgirls:

Queenwood, Loreto Normanhurst and Pymble Ladies College, came 6th, 7th and 8th in the A Final of the Champion Schoolgirl Eight, behind four Victorian schools and Canberra Girls Grammar. There were 20 crews entered.

Roseville were 4th in the U17 Schoolgirl Eight, and Queenwood were 3rd in the Women's U19 Eight.

Tara's Sarah Fahd won the Bronze in the Champion Schoolgirl Single Scull from 31 entries, winning both her heat and semi-final along the way.

Loreto Kirribilli's Alyssa Fickers and Lauren Moran, won the Gold medal in the Champion Women's U17 Double Scull from 21 entries.

In the Champion Schoolgirl Coxed Quad, St Catherine's were 5th in the A final from 20 entries.

Finally Loreto Kirribilli gained both Gold and Bronze in the Champion Schoolgirl coxed Four.

Recollections by Steve Roll Episode 1.

When I started rowing in 1952, my very first coach, Herby Yuille, told our crew quote "If you want to get anywhere in this sport you shouldn't smoke or drink." To a seventeen-year-old who had not taken up either of these vices that made good sense, so I never did. Every time I pray, I thank God for Herby's advice. Over the years, apart from the benefit to my health and rowing, he has saved me a fortune.

I had played a bit of rugby league with the C.Y.O. and we trained twice a week and played on the weekend. When I started rowing my, first selection was determined by the number of nights I could train. No point in picking the best crew if they all went to tech on different nights. Herby sat in the cox's seat and coached us from there, no tinnies in those days. Every so often we would all chip in and hire an inboard speedboat on the weekend and all the coaches would come out together. Herby didn't see much of us on these occasions as the speedboat tended to favour the more senior crews.

Our hands would get sore and blistered, the blisters would break, and we would have blood oozing up from between our fingers. We couldn't let go of the handle or our hands would move around the handle and we would have another set of blisters to contend with. By the next row those blisters would have hardened up a little, and so on until our hands got tough enough for us to see out the season. Then, the next season, we would have to go through it all over again.

We had black steel riggers and they had to be rubbed back at the end of each season, then undercoated and repainted. All the bolts and nuts had to be replaced as the rust would get to them during a second season and they would break.

For most of us the world revolved around the rowing club. Wives, girlfriends, jobs, social life, all took second place to our rowing and, because that was what was happening around us, we accepted it as normal. Many years had passed before I became aware that Leichhardt was so successful because we did more than most others. Without our realising it, we were an elite club even before people started talking about "elite" oarsmen. There was a pace set and, if newcomers couldn't stand the pace, they dropped off without most of us being aware of it.

We usually started training about 6.00 p.m. and most got to the shed by public transport, very few cars in those days. Peter Evatt, Ted Curtain and Rusty Pardoe, the rest of us had push bikes, Don Paterson had a motorbike and sidecar.

I used to knock off work at Alexandria and ride my bike to the club, arriving about five o'clock. I didn't relish the idea of sitting around so I used to go out in what we called a Gladstone skiff - it wasn't. It was a clinker built, cedar planked dinghy as wide as the riggers of a sculling boat with the swivels set into the washboards, it had a sliding seat, leaked like a sieve, and part of the equipment for it was a bailing can. If you forgot the bailing can the boat would be full to the gunwales before you reached Elliott Street wharf at the mouth of Iron Cove. It had a brass strip along the keel and this enabled the boat to be dragged from the club to the pontoon. I would row it down to Long Nose Point most afternoons and be back in time for my crew training. I wasn't "training", I was just "having fun". It was so stable that it didn't need "sitting up", it sat itself up.

Peter Evatt noticed me doing this so one Saturday he told me that I should get into his sculling boat - the club didn't have sculling boats in those days, every sculling boat in the shed belonged to somebody. If one wanted to go sculling one had to ask a boat owner and then they would show you how to scull. So I hopped into Peter's boat at the corner of the pontoon and the boat started to list to the right - and kept listing -and kept listing - until I fell into the water. I came up with everybody on the pontoon laughing their heads off. The skiff was so stable that I didn't have to use my hands to control the balance of the boat, it just "sat up". Thus I had my first lesson in boat balance.

Peter remained my sculling coach until he died. He taught me everything I know about sculling and I am happy to pass that knowledge on to others. Getting back into a sculling boat requires some skill, which he also taught me, and I developed this skill from my desire to make the boat go faster. I would try anything to improve my boat speed and, at those times, I would not be "out of control" but "beyond control" and, if anything happened "out there" I would fly out of the boat. This happened quite often, I often say that I have fallen out of a sculling boat more often than all the scullers on Iron Cove put together.

I was racing Michael Phillips at the Drummoyne regatta one day when I took a tumble. By the time the umpire's boat got around to pick me up, I was back in the boat and going again, I still managed to get second.

Before I started rowing, I had never kept a diary but, for some reason, I started recording everything I did in rowing in a book. I often referred to it for rigging specs and training info. About five years ago it disappeared, I must have put it on a desktop close to the edge and it fell into a waste basket and was dumped. I don't know for sure. All "incidents" were recorded - everything in my rowing life. I can, now, only bring back some of the more notable memories.

Each year the Union awards scholarships to young rowers aged 14 to 19* who display potential and are in need of financial assistance to achieve their goals in the sport.

The Union has awarded 164 scholarships since 1992 assisting young rowers in developing their careers, with a number of the recipients going on to represent New South Wales and Australia.

The scholarships, currently valued at \$1000 each, are used by the recipient for regatta expenses, training expenses or towards the purchase of equipment.

It is a requirement that each recipient continues rowing competitively during the next season, and submits a report on how the funds were used.

Emphasis is placed on developing rowers. Country based athletes, para athletes and those from disadvantaged communities are all encouraged to apply.

*for Para athletes, applicants up to 22 years are welcomed. They are also eligible for the **SPM Plumbing Para Rowing Development Award**

The NSW Union of Rowers Youth Development Fundraiser for 2022 in support of our Junior Athlete Scholarships is now open.

The most significant activity of the Union of Rowers is the ongoing support the Union gives to promising young athletes each year. In 2021 the Union awarded nine scholarships of \$1,000 each, making 164 scholarships awarded since the scheme commenced in 1992.

There were no suitable regattas at which to conduct this year's Lucky Draw, so at the latest meeting of the Executive a random draw was undertaken and the winner of the \$1000 was Kim Rudder (Yes, yours truly!). I have decided to donate the \$1000 back into the Scholarship fund so as to fund one scholarship in 2022. 
The Australian Sports Foundation Ltd (ASF) was established by the Australian government to assist organisations in raising funds through donations for the development of sport in Australia.
